Reading

- Apply growing knowledge of root words, prefixes and suffixes.
- Read and discuss an increasingly wide range of fiction, poetry, plays, non-fiction and reference books or textbooks.
- Read books that are structured in different ways.
- Read for a range of purposes.
- Increase their familiarity with a wide range of books, including myths, legends and traditional stories, modern fiction, fiction from our literary heritage, and books from other cultures and traditions.
- Recommend books that they have read to their peers, giving reasons for their choices.
- Identify and discuss themes and conventions in and across a wide range of writing.
- Make comparisons within and across books.
- Learn a wider range of poetry by heart.
- Prepare poems and plays to read aloud and to perform, showing understanding through intonation, tone and volume so that the meaning is clear to an audience.
- Check that the book makes sense to them, discussing their understanding and exploring the meaning of words in context.
- Ask questions to improve their understanding.
- Draw inferences such as inferring characters' feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions, and justifying inferences with evidence.
- Summarise the main ideas drawn from more than one paragraph, identifying key details that support the main ideas.
- Identify how language, structure and presentation contribute to meaning.
- Distinguish between statements of fact and opinion.
- Retrieve, record and present information from non-fiction.
- Participate in discussions about books that are read to them and those they can read for themselves, building on their own and others' ideas and challenging views courteously.
- Explain and discuss their understanding of what they have read, including through formal presentations and debates, maintaining a focus on the topic and using notes where necessary.
- Vary voice for direct or indirect speech.
- Recognise clauses within sentences.
- Explain how and why a writer has used clauses to add information to a sentence.
- Use more than one source when carrying out research.

Writing

- Use further prefixes and suffixes, and understand the guidance for adding them.
- Spell some words with 'silent' letters (e.g. knight, psalm, solemn).
- Distinguish between homophones and other words which are often confused.
- Use dictionaries to check the spelling and meaning of words.
- Use the first three or four letters of a word to check spelling, meaning or both in a dictionary.
- Use a thesaurus.
- Write legibly, fluently and with increasing speed.
- Identify the audience for and purpose of the writing, selecting the appropriate form.
- Consider how authors have developed characters and settings in what pupils have read, listened to or seen performed.
- Select appropriate grammar and vocabulary, understanding how such choices can change and enhance meaning.
- Describing settings, characters and atmosphere and integrate dialogue.
- Use a wide range of devices to build cohesion within and across paragraphs.
- Use further organisational and presentational devices to structure text and to guide the reader (e.g. headings, bullet points, underlining).
- Assess the effectiveness of their own and others' writing.
- Propose changes to vocabulary, grammar and punctuation to enhance effects and clarify meaning.
- Ensure the consistent and correct use of tense throughout a piece of writing.
- Ensure correct subject and verb agreement when using singular and plural, distinguish between the language of speech and writing and choose the appropriate register.
- Proof-read for spelling and punctuation errors.

Mathematics

- Read, write, order and compare numbers to at least 1,000,000.
- Count forwards or backwards in steps of powers of 10 for any given number up to 1,000,000.
- Interpret negative numbers in context.
- Round any number up to 1,000,000 to the nearest 10, 100, 1,000, 10,000 and 10, 000.
- Add and subtract whole numbers with more than 4 digits, using formal written methods.
- Identify all multiples and factors, including finding all factor pairs.
- Recall prime numbers up to 19.
- Recognise and use square numbers (2) and cube numbers (3).
- Multiply and divide numbers up to 4 digits using formal written methods.
- Multiply and divide numbers mentally drawing upon known facts.
- Multiply and divide whole numbers and those involving decimals by 10, 100 and 1000.
- Solve problems involving addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.
- Identify, name and write equivalent fractions of a given fraction.
- Recognise mixed numbers and improper fractions and convert.
- Add and subtract fractions with the same denominator.
- Multiply proper fractions and mixed numbers by whole numbers.
- Round decimals to the nearest whole number and to one decimal place.
- Recognise the per cent symbol (%) and write percentages as a fraction and decimal.
- Convert between different units of metric measure.
- Understand and use approximate equivalences between metric and common imperial.
- Measure and calculate the perimeter shapes in cm and m.
- Calculate and compare the area of rectangles and estimate the area of irregular shapes.
- Solve problems involving converting between units of time.
- Identify 3-D shapes, from 2-D representations.
- Estimate and compare acute, obtuse and reflex angles.
- Draw given angles, and measure them in degrees (°).
- Identify, describe and represent the position of a shape following a reflection or translation.
- Solve comparison, sum and difference problems using information in a line graph.
- Complete, read and interpret information in tables, including timetables.
